Healthcare standards for children and young people in secure settings

The Royal College of Paediatrics and Child Health (RCPCH) has refreshed the 2013 Healthcare standards for children and young people in secure settings in England to align with changes to regulation, legislation and professional guidance. Secure settings in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland should refer to the original 2013 standards.

Mental health needs of children and young people with learning disabilities

The Children and Young People's Mental Health Coalition (CYPMHC) has published a report looking at the mental health needs of children and young people with learning disabilities in England. Findings from focus groups, literature searches and an expert reference group show that young people with learning disabilities and their families do not always have confidence in the system to meet their mental health needs and often feel ignored. Recommendations include: The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) and Public Health England should map out the provision of preventative mental health support for children and young people with learning disabilities; and DHSC should fund research to strengthen and promote the use of evidence-based mental health interventions for young people with learning disabilities.

Women as Protectors

The NSPCC has published an evaluation of the Women as Protectors service which aims to help mothers and carers protect their children from men in their lives who pose a risk of sexual harm to children. The evaluation looked at what changed for women who attended a 10-week programme and, for those who needed it, a subsequent period of mentoring with a community volunteer. Findings showed that during the programme women: made measurable advances in their mental and emotional wellbeing; gained confidence in their parenting; reported gains in knowledge and understanding about sexual abuse and felt better able to communicate about this with their children; and felt empowered to make decisions about men who were deemed a risk.

Draft domestic abuse bill

The Joint Committee on the Draft Domestic Abuse Bill has published a report giving suggestions for amendments to the Bill, which will cover England and Wales. The report makes recommendations to ensure that children who witness or experience domestic abuse are treated as victims and provided with specialist support, including ensuring that children do not suffer any detriment when they are forced to move to a new area.

Adverse childhood experiences

The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) has published the government's response to the conclusions and recommendations made in the Health and Social Care Select Committee's 'First 1000 days of life' report, which emphasised the impact that exposure to adversity can have during this period. The response outlines actions the government will take in England including: implementing a continuity of carer model to help the most vulnerable mothers and babies and developing a Specialist Community Public Health Nursing (SCPH) standard.

Modern slavery

The Home Office has published new guidance on the role and process of the newly established multi-agency assurance panels (MAAPs). MAAPs are made up of professionals who have experience of working with victims of modern slavery. They have been established to look at cases where a decision has been made that a person is not a victim of modern slavery and can request that a case be reviewed if they consider the decision has not been made in line with guidance.
