Understanding wellbeing after child sexual abuse

The NSPCC's Impact and evidence series features a blog by Dr Debbie Allnock, Dr Camille Warrington and Dr Helen Beckett, from the International Centre: Researching Child Sexual Exploitation, Violence and Trafficking at the University of Bedfordshire, talking about new research that highlights the importance of learning from those affected by sexual abuse. The research will create opportunities for young people who have been sexually abused to share what they think would help improve their wellbeing. The research aims to: map the mental health and wellbeing support needs of young people who experience sexual abuse in adolescence; learn more about how young people define the concepts of mental health, wellbeing and resilience after abuse; and develop a more child-centred theoretical framework for thinking about these issues.
